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STORY IDEAS

DESCRIPTION

This grand hotel exemplifies New England. Its century-old history ties the hotel to the region's heritage while seamlessly offering pristine air, panoramic views of the White Mountains. Originally established as a farm, the Victorian era building first opened in 1879, but the original house was destroyed by fire in 1915. The following year the hotel was reborn, now boasting 96 guest rooms and suites, spectacular mountain views, and a 280-foot wrap-around veranda. Because this hotel is the smallest of New Hampshire's remaining grand hotels, it has earned the nickname of the "baby grand". The hotel is a short walk from the soothing waters of Wildcat River Falls and minutes from a wide array of outdoor attractions, from the state's highest peak to some of the regions best fishing and hiking. A spectacular nine-hole mountain golf course, first constructed in 1931, is open from May through October; during the winter, the snow-covered course becomes part of New England's world-renowned cross-country skiing trails. The property itself offers ample evidence of its rich history-pictures by world-famous photographer Clifton Church grace the hotel's walls. The original barn, today the Carriage House Ballroom, dates back to the building's first days. But such antiquated features merely accentuate the building's historical legacy; in all other ways, the Eagle Mountain House is entirely modern.

This Grande Dame Makes No Pretense About Her Age...

July 3rd the resort marks the beginning of 130 years of service. The hotel is an example of New England Victorian farm house architecture, complete with Arts and Crafts details. The hotel has embarked on a five-year plan to better preserve the building. Phase one included a steel roof, one that will endure harsh winters like last year's 150 inches of snow. Foundations, paint, and even a shutter replacements are planned for this resplendent and quintessential piece of New England architecture, seen by many as pure Americana. Care is being given ensure future visitors will have the same guest experience others have enjoyed for the past 129 years.



Searching For Alternative Energy Sources In Order To Survive...

With the advent of the more automobiles and higher energy costs, America began to lose many of its grand hotels starting in the 1950's. Grand hotels became obsolete and lost their viability when cookie-cutter motels began sprouting up along the new interstate highway program championed by President Eisenhower. Advance the clock fifty years and it appears little has changed. The Eagle Mountain House heats its 56,000 square foot, six-story, wooden structure for up to nine months each year. Due to efficient fuel purchasing and conservation efforts in past years, the resort was able to absorb energy expenses. Forecasts of fuel oil costing \$4+ dollars per gallon now has the resort quickly searching for alternative methods of heating so that it can remain economically viable and open year round. Discussions are underway to develop an efficient wood pellet fired energy plant which would replace 21,000 gallons of oil with 177 tons of wood pellets each year, pellets manufactured locally in New Hampshire. The resort is working on finding funding for this project. By remaining open year round, the resort will continue to support the livelihood and welfare of up to 75 families during the year.

Going Green by 29.9 Miles

Golf has a long heritage in the Jackson area. Arthur Gale, son of the resort's founder, in 1931 elected to convert the hay fields and the farm pastures into a nine-hole golf course. With America in the midst of a depression, the Eagle's course opening coincided with another American icon, the Empire State Building. In what is one of the most unusual examples of historic preservation, the Eagle Mountain House Golf Club took it upon itself to preserve a small artifact of golf and New Hampshire heritage. The famed Mt. Washington Resort at Bretton Woods, NH announced plans to restore their Donald Ross golf course and the Eagle's golf crew learned the original first hole was going to be bulldozed, the hotel asked if they could have it. The management of the Mt. Washington Resort were not opposed 's so the Eagle's golf crew quickly went to work and carefully transferred the entire upper layers of the green, complete with sod, and relocated this historic green to its sixth hole. This maybe the only golf course in the world today that can claim it has a single Donald Ross green.



Green Is Really Cool, Naturally...

There is increasing competition within the hospitality industry to help save the environment and have a positive impact on global warming. While some businesses seem to be going green because it is chic, the Eagle Mountain House and Golf Club has taken some unusual steps to be green. Like most every hotel, this resort converted much of their lighting to CFL's which lowered electricity consumption by nearly 20% in 2007. The single biggest energy savings commitment this hotel continues to make is by offering natural air conditioning, that supplied by Mother Nature herself. With its mountain location and cool nights, air conditioning is limited to only the public spaces of the hotel. It makes little environmental sense to spend over \$1 million to install air conditioning in the hotel that needs man-made refrigerated air for maybe ten days a year and installation that could negatively impact its appearance on the National Register of Historic Places. The hotel has considered the pros and cons of guest room air conditioning; but, saving the environment from tons of additional pollutants empowers the Eagle Mountain House to say no to air conditioning until such time as a better environmental alternative can be found.



HOTEL HISTORY

- In 1879 the original Eagle Mountain House, a New England farm house, opens and accommodates twelve guests.
- Cyrus and Marcia Gale manage the inn and continue to operate the family farm, which produces much of the food enjoyed by their guests. The lower pasture along the Wildcat River is used for farming, grazing animals and producing hay.
- Late in the 1800's a "few" holes of golf were created and kept the Eagle Mountain House competitive with other Jackson hotels. The new sport of golf has arrived from Scotland and is the latest rage!
- The inn is expanded to two buildings accommodating up to 125 guests who enjoy the spectacular views, rural surroundings, the mountain's fresh air and water, and various sports like hiking, swimming, golf, trout fishing, skiing, snowshoeing, and sledding.
- The post and beam barn, original to the first hotel, originally housed horse carts and carriages, and was adapted for use as a two-story garage for automobiles in the early 1900's. The Carriage House as a ballroom which accommodates up to 200 guests.
- In 1915, the main inn was completely destroyed by fire; however, in less than a year the present Eagle Mountain House was rebuilt and re-opened in 1916. The new inn boasted a Veranda, 75 guest rooms and most with an indoor private bath – a rarity in those days.
- World famous photographer Clifton Church, documented many scenes around the original inn in the early 1900's and stayed on as a guest after the 1915 fire. The Eagle Mountain House was one of the few hotels that had a darkroom which enabled Church to process his photographs. There are many original Church photographs on display through out the hotel lobby and tavern. Church donated the "Jackson" sign that hangs on the famous covered bridge as you enter the village – commonly known as the "Kissing Bridge".
- In 1923 Cyrus Gales passes away and operation of the Eagle Mountain House is assumed by his son, Arthur.



- In 1928-1929 Arthur Gale continues to make improvements to the hotel and 50 rooms were added and the Veranda was extended to its current 280 feet length. The hotel appears as you see it today. A new water line connects fresh water from mountain reservoirs to a 50,000-gallon storage water tank on the upper slope of Eagle Mountain. This enormous riveted iron tank remains in use today and is a reserve water supply for the hotel's automatic fire sprinkler system.
- During the hotel 1928-1929 hotel expansion, a "dry" automatic fire sprinkler system is installed throughout the entire hotel. It is the first fire sprinkler system in any resort in New Hampshire. The system remains operational to date and the pipes are constantly charged with compressed air which prevents the possibility of winter freeze-ups. Many believe the introduction of this early technology has preserved the Eagle Mountain House from loss due to minor fires that have occurred. The Eagle Mountain House is one of the few original grand New Hampshire Hotels left standing today. Because of the hotel's small size, it earned the nickname "The Baby Grand".
- Immediately on completion of the hotel expansion, the Stock Market crashes in October 1929. In 1931 the Great Depression consumed America, the Empire State Building was dedicated, and Arthur converts the farm land and cow pasture in front of the hotel into the Eagle Mountain House Golf Course. The original 9-hole course remains playable today and is often viewed as one of the most scenic USGA rated courses in New England. Three of the tees are adjacent to the nationally protected Wildcat River. In the winter months, the course is part of the Jackson Touring Foundation cross country ski trails – the #1 rated Nordic skiing destination in the entire Northeast.
- In December 1936 Carroll Reed's Eastern Slope Region Ski School, originally headquartered in the Wildcat Tavern in Jackson Village, was founded. During Reed's long recovery from a skiing accident in 1934, he reads about the Hannes Schneider Ski School of St. Anton-am-Arlberg, Austria and brings the Schneider School ski-meister, Beno Rybizka, to America. Rybizka conducts the first organized skiing in the Mount Washington Valley on the 9th fairway of the Eagle Mountain House Golf Course.



- In 1937 Carroll Reed (1905-1995) was hired to run Saks Fifth Avenue's ski store in Jackson, New Hampshire. A year later Saks closes and Reed acquired the inventory and opened his own store, in the same location, using his own name. For decades, the Carroll Reed Shop was a landmark for the latest in skiwear and equipment.
- Arthur Gale passes away in 1957 and his sister, Marcia Gale Chadbourne and her husband, Orin, purchase the property and continue to operate the hotel. A swimming pool is added in 1959 and the original hotel rooms are remodeled and all rooms have private baths.
- April 1973 saw the retirement of Marcia and Orin Chadbourne and for the first time ownership of the hotel leaves the family and the hotel is purchased by the Clarke's and Kenyon's. The famous "cast iron eagle" mascot mounted on the boulder at the 9th green disappears.
- In 1986 the inn was totally restored as a "Historic Country Inn" by the current Eagle Mountain House Owners' Association. The hotel currently offers 95 guest rooms and suites - each privately owned. The Association strives to maintain the historic nature of the Inn, while creating a year-round resort for public enjoyment.
- In 1991, the Eagle Mountain House is nominated by the President George W. H. Bush's Secretary of the Interior, Manuel Lujan Jr., for inclusion on the National Register of Historic Places and this is approved by the Congress of the United States.
- In 1995, the hotel is listed on the National Trust for Historic Preservation and is awarded membership in Historic Hotels of America.
- November 2005, the long missing original hotel "cast iron eagle" is returned to the Eagle Mountain House. It is now on display in the hotel lobby.



GENERAL INFORMATION

- The Eagle Mountain House is an original hotel and was built as a hotel.
- The hotel is a full service lodging establishment characterized by timeless ambiance, vintage accommodations and catering to the leisure and business traveler.
- The Eagle Mountain House offers simple charm and provides friendly service.
- Children's (under 18) room stay is FREE when shared by an adult.
- Check-in is after 3 p.m. Check-out is prior to 11 a.m.
- All rooms are non-smoking.
- Rates depend on room type (guest room or suite), view (mountain view or standard), and dates of stay.
- A deposit equal to one night's accommodations required. If you fail to arrive on your confirmed arrival date, you will be charged for one night's room rental plus 8% tax. Should you check-out earlier than your confirmed departure date, you will be charged for the last night that you reserved, unless the guest room is re-rented.
- Each additional adult is \$25 per night (includes breakfast only)
- Each additional child is \$5 per night (includes breakfast only)
- Rollaway bed available for \$10.00 per night
- All rates are subject to an 8% New Hampshire Rooms and Meals Tax. A 16% service gratuity is included for meals in package plans.
- Deposits refunded for cancellations up to 5 days prior to arrival without penalty. A minimum \$25 handling fee is charged on all cancellations.
- Higher rates apply on all room rates and packages during vacation and holiday periods.
- Rates are subject to change without notice.
- Two night minimum on selected weekends and some peak periods.
- Banquet and conference facilities available
- Group rates available and banquet and conference facilities available.
- No pets allowed, please.
- Due to the historic nature of the hotel, rooms have circulating fans in lieu of air conditioning. Public and meeting spaces are air conditioned.
- Rack room rates not to exceed \$400.00 per room per night.

EAGLE MOUNTAIN HOUSE GOLF COURSE

Perched just above the quaint village of Jackson lies one of New Hampshire's prettiest 9-hole golf courses at the Eagle Mountain House. This USGA rated par-32 course wends its way along the Wildcat River and features elevated tees with spectacular mountain views from every hole.

Converted in 1931 from pasture land once used by grazing farm animals from the neighboring Eagle Mountain House, the course now boasts a small pro shop, a beautiful driving range and is open to the public from May through late October. The pro shop carries logo-wear, a limited supply of golf clubs, and golf balls (new and experienced). Gas carts or pull carts are available for rent. The Driving Range provides practice areas for pitching, chipping, driving and sand lies. Purchase a full or half bucket of balls to use and perfect your game!

Bob McGraw, PGA Certified Golf Professional, took charge of the Eagle Mountain House Golf Course in the spring 2006. Mr. McGraw was Director of Instruction and Golf Professional at The Club of New Seabury in Mashpee, MA for six years. Prior to his work on Cape Cod, Bob was Head Golf Professional at Wentworth Golf Club over ten seasons.

Mr. McGraw is a PGA Certified Professional in both Instruction and Golf Operations. In his new position, Bob oversees the day to day operation of the Eagle Mountain House golf course. In addition to his management duties, Bob is available for extensive private and group lessons, clinics and one-day golf schools. He has been actively involved in junior golf programs during his career and has received numerous New England PGA award for his teaching and the promotion of golf.

Since 2006, Bob has been rated by the PGA as the #1 teaching professional in all of New England. He is an accomplished author on golf with writings which include "Winning Edge Series: Chess, Checkers and Golf"; "Perfect Practice"; "Ace" and "Fit For Form".

YOU HAVE ARRIVED...

Jackson is located along the border of Maine in New Hampshire's White Mountains surrounded by the nearly 800,000 acre White Mountain National Forest in the Northeast area of the state. Route 16 is nearby for North-South travel and Route 302 the closest for East-West travel. The hotel is southeast of the summit of Mount Washington, the northeast's highest mountain peak.

Arriving by Air:

There are four major airports within 140 miles of Jackson:

- Portland, Maine - 70 miles
- Manchester, NH - 115 miles
- Boston, MA - 140 miles
- Burlington, VT - 140 miles

Boston's Logan Airport is an international airport with the greatest selection of carriers and service. We suggest you check fares and service to each airport to find the best to suit your schedule and budget.

Arriving by Bus:

Concord Trailways offers service from Logan Airport and South Station in Boston to the Glen Ledge Corner Store on Route 16, about two miles from the Eagle Mountain House.

Arriving by Car:

Public transportation is limited in this area so we recommend you have a car to get around. Beware of moose and deer when driving particularly around dawn and dusk. Here are some approximate mileages from major cities:

Driving directions from three major cities:

From Boston, MA: (approx. 3 hours - 140 miles)

Take Interstate 95 North to the Spaulding Turnpike/Route 16 North. From Portsmouth, NH travel approximately 80 miles on NH Route 16 north to North Conway. Continue on NH Route 16 through North Conway, Intervale and Glen. In Glen, turn right and remain on NH Route 16 North and travel 2 miles to Jackson Village NH Route 16. Turn right and follow through the RED COVERED BRIDGE and into Jackson village bearing left at the fork in the road. After crossing over the stone bridge, turn right onto Carter Notch Road which is immediately across from the white church. Go up the hill 3/4 mile, past Jackson Falls, and the Eagle Mountain House will be on your left.

From New York City, NY: (approx. 6 hours - 347 miles)

Take interstate 95 North to I-91 North to I-84 East to I-90 (Mass Pike). Take I-90 East to I-495 North to I-95 North. Follow I-95 North to the Spaulding Turnpike/Rte 16 North. From Portsmouth, NH travel approximately 80 miles on NH Route 16 north to North Conway. Continue on NH Route 16 through North Conway, Intervale and Glen. In Glen, turn right and remain on NH Route 16 North and travel 2 miles to Jackson Village NH Route 16. Turn right and follow through the RED COVERED BRIDGE and into Jackson village bearing left at the fork in the road. After crossing over the stone bridge, turn right onto Carter Notch Road which is immediately across from the white church. Go up the hill 3/4 mile, past Jackson Falls, and the Eagle Mountain House will be on your left.

From Portland, ME: (approx. 1.5 hours - 70 miles)

Take US Route 302 West to Glen, NH. In Glen, turn right and remain on NH Route 16 North and travel 2 miles to Jackson Village NH Route 16. Turn right and follow through the RED COVERED BRIDGE and into Jackson village bearing left at the fork in the road. After crossing over the stone bridge, turn right onto Carter Notch Road which is immediately across from the white church. Go up the hill 3/4 mile, past Jackson Falls, and the Eagle Mountain House will be on your left.



WINTER VACATION TIME WITH KIDS & TEENS

Plan a ski trip to the town where it all began! Over 50 years ago, Black Mountain in Jackson, just two miles from the Eagle, was the site of the first ski lift in America. Guests can cross country ski from the Hotel's front door on the #1 network in the East, downhill ski at one of over five area mountains, join a guided nature tour on snowshoes, snow tube, ride the Snow Coach to above tree line on Mt. Washington or enjoy a horse-drawn sleigh ride during a winter stay at Eagle Mountain House!

Cross Country Skiing (Nordic):

Over 450 KM of trails are available for exploration at six area Nordic centers. Each facility offers trails for all abilities, rentals, lessons, learn-to-ski packages and experienced personnel to outfit you and answer your questions. Many also offer snowshoes for rent or purchase along with scheduled guided nature tours. Here is a list of area Nordic centers with the amount of tracked/groomed trails they offer.

- **Jackson Cross Country**, Jackson • 96 KM trails
- **Great Glen Trails**, Pinkham Notch • 20 KM trails
- **Bear Notch**, Bartlett • 60 KM trails

Downhill Skiing (Alpine):

There are six area mountains within a short drive offering more than 300 trails and glades to ski on over 1325 acres of land. Each mountain has experienced personnel to get you ready for a great day on the slopes.

- **Attitash**, Bartlett • 70 trails • 12 lifts
- **Wildcat Mountain**, Pinkham Notch • 47 trails • 4 lifts
- **Cranmore**, North Conway • 46 trails • 5 lifts
- **Bretton Woods**, Twin Mountain • 101 trails • 9 lifts
- **King Pine**, Madison • 16 trails • 6 lifts



KIDS' PROGRAMS AT LOCAL SKI AREAS

Keeping kids happy, even on a vacation, can be a real challenge -- but it's easy at any of New Hampshire's kid-friendly winter resorts. The programs and activities for winter fun at these areas have plenty of options for kids of all ages - from little tykes to teens. Programs for younger skiers combine personal attention, safety, and instruction along with the opportunity to make new friends on the slope. For older kids and teens, there's the exciting world of half-pipes, terrain parks, snow-toys, night skiing, snow-tubing and any number of wild and crazy fun events to enter or watch.

Black Mountain:

Black is known for being family friendly. The ski area is the ideal size for kids to enjoy and remains uncrowded even at the busiest of times.

Kids' Programs: Black has programs for all ages of kids. The Tots Snow Flake is for kids' ages 3 & 4, Snow Busters is for ages 5-8, and Mountain Action Gang is for kids 9-12 years old.

Cranmore Mountain:

Cranmore offers a variety of family-friendly programs either by day or for an entire season.

Young Children: The Snowsports School has daily programs for young children, including a variety of Value Deals that package lift tickets with rentals, equipment, and lunch. Also offered are seasonal programs such as the Adventure Camp for ages 8-14, and the Penguin camp for ages 4-7.

Teens: Cranmore has become a major scene of activity for snow play of all sorts - from traditional skiing and snowboarding, to activities like snow tubing or downhill gliding on snow scoots, snow foxes, snow bikes, and ski boards. There's plenty of terrain-park and half pipe activity; even beginner and intermediate sliders can have fun on banked corners, rolls, and jumps. For those who still have energy, night skiing is offered on Saturdays.



Wildcat Mountain:

Wildcat Tracks Training Center Children's Programs: The Wildcat Tracks training Center starts kids as young as 3-5 with the Lion Cubs Snow play Program. In the Lions Den you'll find full and half day programs available for ages 4-12, and snowboard programs for ages 8-12. For teens, and mom and dad there are lessons and rental packages for all abilities and consecutive day packages are available. Nursery care is also available for full and half days for kids' ages 2 months-5 years at the Kitten Club Nursery.

First Tracks Pass: Participants (age 6 and older) take four learn to ski or ride lessons and get a free season pass for the rest of the season. Lessons are two hours each, and include lift ticket and rental equipment.

Attitash:

The Adventure Center: Located right at the base area, the Attitash Adventure Center has everything under one roof for families and kids. All learn-to-ski and learn-to-ride programs, children's programs, seasonal programs, day care facilities, rental equipment, and adaptive programs for disabled skiers originate at the Adventure Center.

Young Children: The Buddy Bear Kids program (age 4-6) and the Adventure Kids and Low Riders program (age 7-12) include lessons and lift tickets.

Teens: For teens interested in joining seasonal programs that offer great instruction, exciting competition and peer camaraderie, there is the Attitash Racing Development Team, the Bump Busters Freestyle Team and the Snowboard Competition Team. Almost every weekend there is just-for-fun events open to all ability levels.
